### **MEMBERS' BENEFITS**

1. Library borrowing rights for \$50 per annum which is far cheaper than what it costs ordinary members of Convocation.
2. The right to buy packs of one-day parking scratchies which entitle you to park all day in Visitor Parking spots at ANU for \$2 a day. Also, the right to apply for free parking for special events such as Conferring of Degrees Ceremonies and other high days. Ordinary members of the public are not entitled to these benefits. They have to park in designated areas and feed the metres.

4. A place in the pages of the ANU Annual Report.
5. An ability to get staff discounts from PCTech.
6. The right to use University House library facilities.

### **RAPLINK: AN EXAMPLE OF ANUEF WORKING IN THE COMMUNITY**

ANUEF Member Elizabeth Murphy has provided the following story about a valued link between ANUEF and the Community.

'Soon after the ANUEF Annual General Meeting, two members, David Ingle (Dingle) Smith and Elizabeth Murphy had a chat about possible help for a community of farmers in Queensland. These farmers were having a bad time as a result of ground water depletion in their area, put down by them to the activities of a local industrial operation over many years. Dingle Smith had been working on the water and irrigation issue for some time. RAPlink, through Elizabeth Murphy, came into the case at the point where the community was feeling frustrated in its approaches to government officials, lawyers and industrial executives. RAPlink has now been able to set up a very useful link between the community and a barrister in Sydney, who has provided much-needed legal advice to them. As a result, they say, 'Our approach will now be made with more grace than it might have been.' At the same time, because many of the now ageing farmers have emotional and lifestyle problems to deal with, another link has been set up between the community and a social worker who is assembling a team to help address retirement and other social needs in the community.

This has been a successful linking assignment for RAPlink, and it wouldn't have happened without RAPlink's association with the ANUEF. RAPlink is grateful for the support of the ANUEF -- please continue to work with us in this way.'

ANUEF may also soon be working on a project with Volunteering ACT. More news about that later.

### **COMMITTEE NEWS**
