# **OUR USEFULNESS TO ANU**

The ANU is beginning to understand and take advantage of the assistance that we offer to our University.

Policy in the developmental stages has been referred to us for comment, notably the proposed policy on intellectual property, technology transfer and related matters. The ANUEF submission on this paper was put together by Adrian Gibbs after a consultation process with the members.

Fenner Hall has contacted ANUEF about tutoring help. We have an agreement with the NTEU that we will not volunteer for work which should be performed by paid staff. However, the Fenner Hall tutoring falls outside that definition and would not be performed at all without volunteer support.

The Human Resources Division has asked us to assist in counselling sessions for staff contemplating retirement. We have given our consent to this idea, but so far our services have not yet been used.

A number of our members have contributed to the ANU Endowment for Excellence, either through major gifts, bequests, or the Annual Giving Program. This is a useful way for members to make a major impact on the life of the ANU.

Our two summer schools are our biggest contribution to the ANU's outreach programs. Other such work includes our assistance to RAPlink which gives academic guidance and support to rural and remote communities experiencing problems of all kinds. Our members are involved in many other one-to-one links with community groups, bringing assistance to them in many small ways.

ANUEF made a submission to the Nelson Enquiry - 'Higher Education at the Cross-Roads', which is highly supportive of the role of the ANU in Higher Education and Research in Australia. Our Chair, John Molony, has been invited to address the Reference Group. He is also seeking an audience with the Minister and some members of the Faculty.

Those of our members who wish to do so can make application for membership of one of the National Institutes in the ANU. These programs offer another avenue for ANUEF members to take part in the intellectual life of the University.
